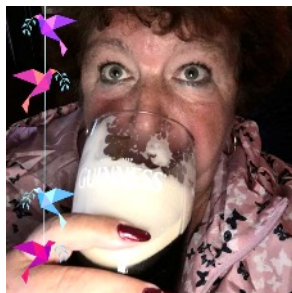

Send A Child to Hucklow Fun (SACH)

Here is an extract from the service which was given recently by Judith Short, a trustee of the fun. The accommodation has changed considerably from the days



when children stayed in the huts pictured here, and washed in cold water provided near the wall at the bottom of the field. I was assured by a pre-ww2 visitor that they didn't mind - it was a good excuse to stick to 'a lick and a promise'

The holiday centre at Great Hucklow had its origins in the closing years of the 19th century. With new buildings added along the way, for a good fifty years it served its purpose well – that of providing simple inexpensive holidays in the countryside for thousands of children. Most of these came from our Sunday schools in the northern industrial towns and cities. However, by the closing years of the 1950s it was obvious from waning bookings that our Sunday Schools were in decline, and that there was no longer the same need in our churches for such holidays.

However, in 1961 the Rev Peter Godfrey, supported by the Rev Glyn Pruce, wrote a letter to The Inquirer. It appeared on the 9th December 1961:

“At this time of year members of churches, chapels, Sunday Schools, choir parties and so forth will be asking themselves what they are going to do with their special Christmas collections. With this in mind we would ask your readers to give their financial support to a scheme we are arranging to send twenty children to Great Hucklow for a few days next April. One of the great things done by our Homes at Great Hucklow was to acquaint children who rarely, if ever, left cities like Manchester and Sheffield, with the beauties of the countryside. There are still children like this. The Family Service Units work amongst them and know them well. The Manchester Unit will be glad to suggest children who will benefit from such a holiday. All that is needed is the money to send them.”

The appeal to readers raised £61 so that sixty years ago, in 1962, a party of children from Manchester had a holiday at Hucklow. That was the beginning of the Send a child to Hucklow fun. Since then groups have come from as far away as London, Glasgow, the Isle of Wight, Northern Ireland, metropolitan areas in the North and Midlands and many more. Over the past sixty years thousands of children have benefited greatly from the holidays. Some have found their asthma eased, some have made new friends, some have shown improvements in manners and behaviour, some have enjoyed a break from responsibilities at home. All have been introduced to a new lifestyle which will, hopefully, influence their lives for ever. Sixty years later, with an alarming proportion of families living in poverty, there are still children whose only chance of a break from routine life is via SACH.

There was a hymn written by Rev John Allerton in celebration of the 50th anniversary of SACH. I reproduce the words here.

Would that all children could be free
To be their children's selves: to play
To have good food and cosy beds
And live contentedly each day.

Alas we know this is not so
For many children. Thus we hear
Of deprivation and abuse
Of young lives raised with needs and fear.

We can't do much! But we at least
Can take a few such souls and try
To set them free to run and laugh
Upon green grass, beneath blue sky.

In Hucklow's green and pleasant land,
Just for a few days they can find
That there is care, and warmth, and smiles,
And there are grown-ups who are kind.

A candle lit is better far
Than darkness cursed. The smiling face
Of one small child will wonders work
And bring to earth all heaven's grace.



Fulwood WI



Fulwood has a new Women's Institute

On a cold March evening, Fulwood Old Chapel was alive with chatter and laughter as 64 women came together to show an interest in the formation of a new WI.

Local resident, Victoria Cobley, who set up the meeting said: "When I moved to Fulwood I wanted to continue with my WI membership. I started in 2011 and was part of the group that set up Nether Edge WI. I wasn't able to join Mayfield WI due to childcare issues for my two small children.

"At the beginning of March 2022, Dorothy from South Yorkshire Federation called me to say that Mayfield WI was disbanding and would I be interested in setting up a new WI for the community."

Jumping at the chance to keep a WI in the area Victoria had to work quickly to get an interest meeting up and running.

"I did two quick posts on the Fulwood Facebook groups to see if there was an interest for it. Within 24 hours I had to set up a page and had over 100 likes. I was amazed", said Victoria.

The interest meeting went well, and the group was officially formed in April 2022 with Victoria as President and a fantastic group of women volunteering for the committee.

Meeting on the first Tuesday of every month (except August) with a 7:30 pm start, the group has an exciting list of speakers for their first year.

Talking about the programme, Victoria said: "Getting good speakers in your first year is hard, as the best ones are always booked up in advance. I looked local and found some brilliant businesses. At the first meeting, we welcomed Lana. An ex-John Lewis Partner, she has used her redundancy to set up a fantastic lingerie shop in Crookes. June, we welcomed the wonderful Tim Blundell-Jones who spoke to us about gardening and growing in the space you have. July we are so excited to welcome PA Jewellery, who have a very well-established shop in Crookesmoor."

With 58 members the group is still accepting new members. If you are not sure, then the committee welcome you to come as a guest. The guest fee is £5, and you just need to show up on the night.

"People always ask me what age it is. I am 36 and there are women younger than me that come and women older than me. The WI isn't about age it's about having 2 hours to yourself, to learn something new, meet new people, have fun and a cup of tea and a bit of cake. As president, I think I set the tone, and the tone of Fulwood WI is definitely to have fun"

Taking a Servicel

It is custom at FOC to invite different leaders to take our services: some of our celebrants are ordained Ministers; some are Lay people, of whom a few are well used to leading services at FOC and elsewhere, while others have something they want to impart on a particular occasion.

Peter Rowson is one of our experienced Lay preachers, and Sue Toulson asked him to share with us some of the ways he prepares his Services.

Peter says, I am quite happy to do this, but would like to make it clear that Janet and I are relative newcomers to Unitarianism compared to many members of our congregation. We do not have the deep emotional ties that were apparent for instance in Judith's presentation who gave us a fascinating on Send A Child to Hucklow.

However, here goes!

The first time I was actively involved in leading a service was in January 2003; June Pettitt was leading the service and she asked if I would do the address on homelessness. I dug it out the other day, and it was far too long! But it did give me an appetite for dipping my toe in a bit deeper and since then I've taken quite a number of services.

I'm sure, by now, I should be able to reel them off, but that is definitely not the case and each service presents a new, if different, challenge. I remember a Church of England minister sympathising with me on this; he said services needed to be hard if something meaningful was to be communicated. He also commented that Unitarian service leaders have a much tougher job than most other religious leaders because there is so little ritual to guide through.

I've always found the choice of a theme is the hardest part; so help with this would be much appreciated! Some years ago I read a book about the value of being wrong, and how we don't learn by being right all the time; I found this very comforting! I don't try to be wrong, but I'm afraid it is bound to happen sometimes; it is good to know that we are a tolerant congregation and no-one expects the impossible.

I think being involved in congregational services has helped me enormously and I would urge people to use this as a first step towards leading a service. We all come to Unitarianism from different backgrounds and with different views and priorities and it would be marvellous to hear some of these different voices from the lectern.

What is so marvellous is that Unitarians are so open and we are not ready to criticise!

Why not have a go!

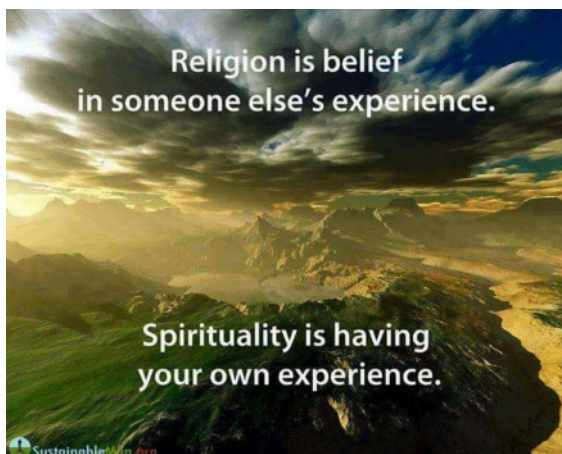

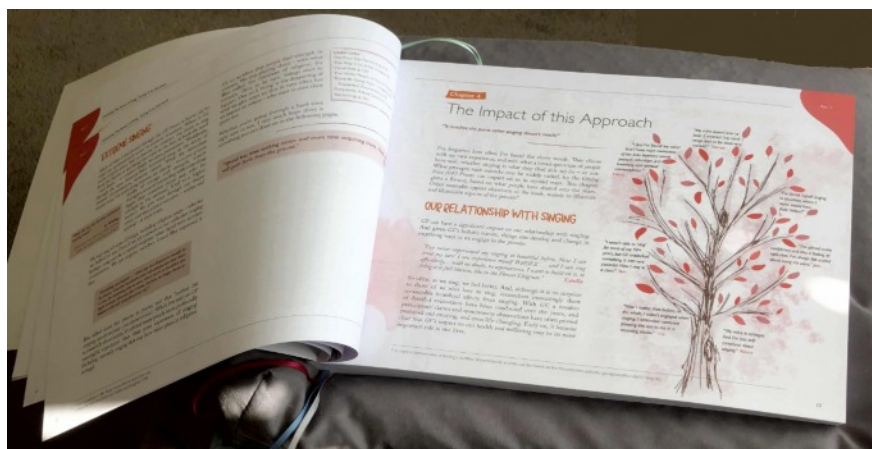
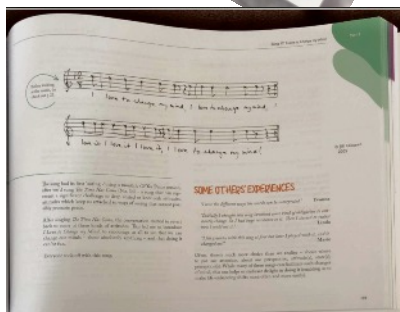
Unlocking the Power of Song - A Companion for Challenging Times

A few weeks ago, Caroline Thorpe came to the Sheffield District Women's League meeting at Upper Chapel, to present 'Unlocking the Power of Song', an approach to understanding how much song can offer us, in any situation; how it can help us expand our awareness, give voice to our truer selves, and embody the changes we want to see. You would need to ask Caroline for the fuller picture or use the Giving Voice Foundation website (above). Caroline brought with her copies of the beautiful book which is the companion to the process.

The book is large, 370 pages, and beautifully produced, with delightful sketches, hand drawn examples of music, and a wonderfully clear, step by step layout. It's printed on smooth, tactile paper, a pleasant experience in itself. At £25 inc p&p (£20 in person from Caroline) it represents very good value for money (in my opinion!) and would make a lovely gift for anyone wanting to connect with the web of life and find their place in the bigger picture. Fulwood Old Chapel in the past

Going through yet more of my late father's papers recently (were you aware that Philip Howard Cooper apparently never threw away a piece of paper in his entire long lifetime? It's true) I found copies of some predecessors of this magazine. One was The Sheffield Unitarian Monthly Record, dated April 1915. It included news and notices for Upper Chapel (very much the central Unitarian church in Sheffield), Upperthorpe Chapel, services conducted at the Vestry Hall, Crookesmoor Rd (was this the forerunner to Unity Church?) Underbank Chapel, Stannington, and Attercliffe Unitarian Church, Shirland Lane. You must have noticed that there was no mention above of Fulwood Old Chapel. At that time it wasn't Unitarian. The building had been hired by the Congregationalists.

Here I found the reason that the document had been carefully preserved: it contained the notice of the wedding, on March 17th, of Miss Sarah Hall and Sgt Luke Cooper – my grandparents.

However, Fulwood makes its appearance in the Monthly Record of Upper Chapel, dated August 1940. There is no mention of Upperthorpe (or Unity) or Underbank, as this was no longer the newsletter of the Sheffield Unitarians. This time, only Attercliffe and Fulwood were included, both of them at the time 'satellites' of Upper. The Minister in Charge at Attercliffe was the Rev Leslie Belton, also minister at Upper (where he later married Barbara Harrison and Sgt Philip Cooper). Minister at Fulwood is recorded as being Rev D.T.Evans, whose address is given as Underbank Parsonage, Stannington. (Perhaps Maud wasn't our first 'Share')! I could be wrong, but I've a feeling that this may have been a wartime arrangement.
